Kibitzing Schedule (EDT) For all KO days of the 2026 USBCs, kibitzing times will be :

Segment 1: 11:30 am EDT

Segment 2: 1:45 pm EDT

Segment 3: 5:00 pm EDT

Segment 4: 7:15 pm EDT

For Round Robin days, each kibitzing segment will start 30 minutes after play starts.

To view a Single Table, click on the blue arrow on the scores page. It provides the largest view of one table, with buttons to get to other information.

Match View will show the two tables of a match side by side on your screen;

Split View will give you 4 panes of your window and you can put whatever you want in each of them to watch 2 side-by-side matches at once, or one match and the scores of others.

Click on Buttons to get interesting information:

- The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board;
- the arrow in the bottom right corner takes you to the scoresheet
- the DDS shows the double dummy analyses. Besides that there is a button for the other table of the same match,
- at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.
- **NEW THIS YEAR:** Written commentary will show in a large area on the left of the screen in Single Table view and at the top of the screen in Match View. If you are interesting in providing written commentary, please email Jan and she will get you authorized.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

The hospitality suite (room 2321) will be open most of the day. You may watch Vugraph or get a snack when there. We are providing breakfast and lunch each day of play. **Marie France Benoit** will be our lead hostess, with help from **Jacob** and **Marge Morgan**. If you can volunteer to help with hospitality (mainly picking up last-minute things at Costco and other local stores) please let Jan Martel or Marie France know and they will put you to work!!

Breakfast: From 8:00-10:00 am. There will be the usual breakfast food: cereal, bagels, toast, salmon, fruit, juice, coffee and tea. Keurig coffee will be available in the hospitality suite. So long as the suite doesn't become too crowded, you are welcome to eat there.

Lunch: On the first three days of the Open and Mixed USBCs we will be serving a buffet lunch in the hotel restaurant. The hotel is unwilling to have people take food out of the restaurant to eat someplace else. Lunch will be served from 12:30-2:30. The second Round Robin match each day is scheduled to end at 1:10 and the third match starts at 2:30.

After the first 3 days of each event, lunch will be available in the hospitality suite from 1:45-3:45. There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, berries, cookies or other desserts.

There is a water dispenser in the hospitality suite. Please bring a water bottle to use. Soft drinks will be available in refrigerators. As with breakfast, you are welcome to eat in the hospitality suite unless it is too crowded.

Let us know if you have specific needs: please make our hosts aware of your needs and they will do their best to accommodate you.

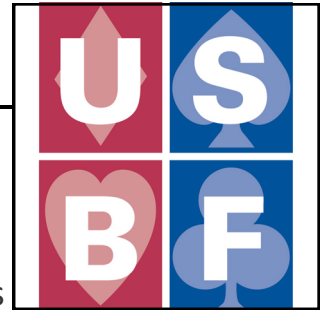

On Board 8 of Round 1, 6S is cold but not easy to bid. In 6 out of the 8 matches, this hand created a significant swing. Interestingly, in the two matches where there were pushes, Bramley/Henner bid and played game at both tables while Davinci/Rathi played slam at both tables.

The play is easy. With everything splitting and sitting well, there are 12 top tricks and if declarer takes a finesse for either round queen, there are 13 for the taking.

The pairs that played it and made it from South were lucky to have West on lead. West had two 4-card suits and, while the spade suit was stronger, the diamond suit looked "safer".

But as the familiar adage suggests, playing IMPs, it is often better to attack than to go peacefully!

In Bramley/Goodman, Adam Kaplan led the D2, enabling declarer to take 11 tricks: 6 clubs, 3 diamonds, and 2 hearts.

In Hans/Rosenthal, Zach Grossack led the DT (Rusinow), allowing Ming Sheng to collect the same 11 tricks.

It is easy to sympathize with the four pairs who played in a not-unreasonable 6C. Had the HQ been onside, they could and would have been successful.

Nickell/Katz bid 6NT. Debbie Rosenberg, East, made an aggressive double (Her side hadn't made a call.) and backed up her thinking with the lead of the ST. The contract failed 3 tricks for a 10 IMP swing when Debbie's teammates bid 6C in the other room and failed by one trick.

Only Bailey/Jacobs was a push with both North/South pairs landing in the making 5C.

If you look at the records of the hands online and notice that in the first match, it says that Chris and Donna Compton were playing with one another (and you also notice in the team list that Donna in the non-playing captain of the team), this was a typo. Please disregard it.
